WHAT WE DO

Plumbers install, repair and maintain plumbing fixtures and water, hydraulic, drain, waste, vent, low-pressure steam, residential fire, chemical, and irrigation systems in residential, industrial, institutional, and commercial building sites. Sometimes, plumbers install medical gas, process piping, compressed air, water conditioner, fuel piping, sewage, water treatment, and storage and flow equipment systems. Plumbers work with copper, steel, plastic, glass, cast iron, cement, fibreglass, and specialty materials to assemble and fit pipe sections, in addition to using welding, soldering, and hoisting and lifting equipment. They read and interpret blueprints to determine layouts of plumbing systems and water supply networks. In addition, they have to work with the pipes themselves, measuring, cutting, bending, and threading them to join with couplings and welding tools. Plumbers work in shifts, on their own, or in a team. They need to be safety aware, show attention to detail, have math and planning skills, mechanical aptitude, patience, and coordination. Plumbers may also need to perform heavy lifting, work in uncomfortable positions, at heights, or in confined spaces. People experienced in this trade can become foremen, estimators, transfer their skills to other pipe trades, or start their own business.²

PREPARATORY WORK

- Research the labour market, job shadow or take a test drive in a trade
- 500 hours toward apprenticeship can be obtained from approved public school programs and experiences like Cooperative Education, Skilled Trades, the Options and Opportunities (O₂) Program, and Building Futures for Youth. 16- to 19-year-olds can become a Youth Apprentice.³
- Take youth health and safety courses where offered in the province of Nova Scotia
- High School Diploma or Equivalency⁴

PRE-APPRENTICESHIP & PRE-EMPLOYMENT PROGRAMS⁵

- Memorial Composite High School (http://www.cbv.ns.ca/mchs) Plumbing Program worth 1000 apprenticeship hours and Group A technical training credit when you register as an apprentice with the NS Apprenticeship Agency (NSAA)
- The Constructing the Future (Bridging to Apprenticeship) Program from the Black Business Initiative (http://www.bbi.ca) worth 375 apprenticeship hours
- Nova Scotia Community College's two-year Pipe Trades Diploma Program (worth 2000 apprenticeship hours and Group A technical training credits), one-year Plumbing Certificate Program (worth 1000 apprenticeship hours and Group A technical training credits), and one-year Steamfitting/Pipefitting Certificate Program (worth 1000 apprenticeship hours)6
- 12-week Plumber Pre-Employment Program worth 430 hours of apprenticeship from the United Association of Journeymen and Apprentices of the Plumbing and Pipefitting Industry of the United States and Canada (UA), Local 56 (through the UA 56 Pipe Trades Career College)7

DIRECT ENTRY⁸

- Gain employment in a workplace with at least one journeyperson and register as an apprentice
- Must complete 7200 hours of on-the-job experience and 5- to 7-week technical training
- Must write your Red Seal Interprovincial Standards Examination and obtain a Certificate of Qualification in the trade from the NSAA
- Additional training is available through UA Locals 56, 244 and 682


PLUMBERS' CAREER PATHWAY

Cooperative Education: Grades 10, 11 and 12 and at least 16 years of age to be eligible. Provides 100 apprenticeship hours per course credit. Co-op placement must be completed under the supervision of a journeyperson.

Skilled Trades: High school courses satisfying academic requirements and providing 110 apprenticeship hours per course credit, if taught by a journeyperson.

Summer Youth Programs: Are available to students in Grades 10 and 11 providing up to 300 apprenticeship hours through a combination of in-class and on-the-job placement, earning the students up to 3 high school Co-op credits.

Youth Apprenticeship: Ages 16-19. Paid hours that can be counted toward trade designation. Find a certified employer and register as a Youth Apprentice with the NSAA (\$14.89 registration fee.). May overlap with co-op placements in high school.
